Brief Description of Internship: The intern will work closely with the Student Engagement Manager and Director of Education to plan and execute three important spring Museum Nights events, February 11, March 11 and April 8, 2027.

The selected candidate will build ties between Harn and the Museum University Student Educators (MUSEs), a volunteer student group. They will conduct meetings and assume a leadership role for the Harn MUSEs to cultivate vital leadership and team-building abilities.

The prospective intern will undertake professional and academic development opportunities during their internship through mentorship and weekly meetings, as well as readings and discussions with their supervisor.

Specific Duties:

- MUSE Leadership – Coordinate student volunteer group to create hands-on activities and engagement.
- Program development research – Intern will work with Programs and to research current educational imperatives in the museum field, develop lesson plans and technical instructions for execution of future programs.
